I have been told that some students are not taking the tests seriously because there is no incentive such as a grade to take the test. It is incumbent on each teacher to set the tone of the progress monitoring test and let students know how important that they are. Incentives like a free homework pass or extra credit may help students take the test more seriously. That way we can truly judge to some degree what concepts need further support to insure mastery. It's always interesting when new testing begins and new teaching materials are being used. I appreciate the work that teachers are doing to deal with both things this year. I look forward to positive results for the students and also for district.

Thank you for your attention to Black History Month. There have been great celebrations and programs throughout the district to commemorate. A special thanks goes to Dr. Sue Woltanski for her presentations to elementary students in grade 3, 4, and 5 on Rosa Parks. 

March 1st is a big day for our 11th grade students as they will participate in the school day SAT, seniors in need of a concordant score will also be testing.

A generic educator job posting for the 2023-24 school year is open in social media and in our Frontline applicant system. Personal assistance can be provided to applicants with how to 1) become qualified for consideration; 2) navigate the FDOE and MCSD application processes; 3) review resources available in our New Employee Resource Guide; 4) locate MCSD salary and benefit information; and 5) determine the schools closest to the area(s) of the FL Keys they may most be interested in teaching.

## OPERATIONS & PLANNING

Having received School Board approval of Design Development, Tommy Roberts Memorial Stadium/Rex Weech Field project now moves to the fourth phase of design, Construction Documents. All of the pre-design, schematic, and design development work takes its final shape with the Construction Documents phase, the largest of the design process. During this phase, the Construction Documents will fill in all the details that will enable the contractor to actually build the project.

Director of Construction & Distribution Services, Doug Pryor says, "The goal of the Construction Document Phase is to accurately and completely document all aspects of the three previous design phases. The drawings are used to bid and ultimately, construct the project."
