
### **CONTINUED COMMUNITY RELATIONS**

The Department of Human Resources proudly sets MCSD standards by supporting employees with District guidance toward staying on track with important dates and educator certification. This enables the District and schools to satisfy requirements set forth in contracts and by the FDOE. Timelines for providing educator and administrative contracts, signing of annual acknowledgements, educator reporting, reappointment of staff for the next school year, observations, evaluations and bargaining negotiations are all major HR priorities. A current top priority includes recruitment, retention and hiring of highly qualified staff and educators. This includes expanding our reach with early job postings. The HR Team is working hard to recruit for the 2024-2025 school year. Schools are being updated with lists of educators released and/or requesting a transfer to assist with hiring decisions for the 2024-2025 school year. Continued Get-To-Know MCSD meetings for applicants at 4:00 pm every Wednesday on Teams are providing very positive results with early hiring. Most applicants are indicating they are scheduled for interviews and currently looking into and obtaining area housing. It's our hope that all school staff and educators enjoy a wonderful Summer and come back to us refreshed and feeling supported by their HR Team!

### **OPERATIONS AND PLANNING**
