Dear Team Monroe,

We're reached the 19th day of school already and it's time for progress reports to go home. Please take a moment to look at those students who appear to need some assistance to be successful in your class. Have a chat with him or her and offer some support. That's really the ticket to creating an atmosphere that is hopeful and productive for students. If we remember back to all the things we learned about becoming teachers and making a difference in the lives of students, failure was not a part of the picture. We have to embrace the thought that students don't want to fail, but they may need a relationship with you to push them forward. It is very important to realize that EL students should have the opportunity to earn grades that are equivalent to the grades earned by general education students. Teachers should work collaboratively with the ESOL contact to make instruction comprehensible to the student at his/her level of English language proficiency. EL students will receive grades based on their progress in acquiring English skills and progress towards mastery of benchmarks and grade level standards. EL students may not be penalized or given a failing grade if curriculum, instructional strategies, materials, and assessments have not been accommodated and/or modified to meet their language needs. Documentation of such strategies, accommodations, and/or modifications is required. That's why it is important to have conversations with the student and the EL contact before issuing a failing grade.

We know that "Relationships are the Key" to a productive future. Make sure to know the types of help a student can get at your school be it - before school tutoring, afterschool tutoring, support during lunch or through a paraprofessional in the classroom or perhaps you supervise your own tutoring opportunities – make sure to share these avenues of support with the students. Top performing students may need similar kinds of supports and a pat on the back to keep them moving forward as well, if we catch all students before they feel overwhelmed, and failure is knocking at their door, we can have great impact on their academic success.

ASSESSMENT & ACCOUNTABILITY

September marks the start of our Fall EOC (End-of-Course) retake exams for high school students. From September 9th through October 4th, students will have the opportunity to retake their Civics, US History, Biology, Geometry, Algebra 1, or FAST Grade 10 ELA assessments. Students may choose to retake exams for various reasons, such as improving their course grades, meeting graduation requirements, or aiming for qualifying scores for the Scholar Diploma designation. It's crucial for students to take advantage of these testing opportunities to fulfill their graduation requirements.

Internal Services is pleased to announce the rollout of a new and improved electronic procurement platform through OpenGov. This new procurement system will leverage artificial intelligence to facilitate the issuance of bids and assist the district in reaching a much wider audience of prospective contractors and suppliers to support a variety of school projects. We would also like to welcome Neilany Garcia as she transitions into the Property Control Specialist position with continued assistance from Maria Portal. Neilany, Taylor and Gaelan are working hard towards additional improvements anticipated to bring further streamlining to property control and records management procedures. Over the past few weeks, Management Information Systems has completed the submission Survey 6 (DOE derives school districts' start of year enrollment counts); Survey F (Adult Education summer term enrollments); Survey G (Adult Education enrollment counts for new term); Survey R (monthly SESIR data). We have also consolidated and updated the 24 Credit graduation requirements within Focus.

Along with daily Risk Management, Workers Compensation and Student accident-related issues, Risk Management continues to recognize potential hazards that could affect school operations, such as emergencies, critical incidents, and health and safety issues on a daily basis to ensure that all employees can come to a safe and healthy work place.

HUMAN RESOURCES AND INSTRUCTIONAL LEADERSHIP

Our Human Resources team participated in the Coral Shores College Fair, where we had the opportunity to interact with all juniors and seniors. 


CONTINUED TEACHING AND LEARNING

CONTINUED TEACHING AND LEARNING

Taylor Thomason, an eighth-grade student from Sugarloaf School earned second place in her category in the Junior Division at the State Science and Engineering Fair in Lakeland in April 2024. Taylor earned an additional prize, an invitation to apply to Thermo Fisher Scientific Junior Innovators Challenge (JIC), for her work with The Contribution of Polyethylene Plastics on Ocean Acidification. Taylor has just received the distinction of being chosen as part of the top 300 entries, from 1,862 applicants from across the United States. This distinction comes with a monetary prize, JIC merchandise, and additional prizes. Taylor will also be recognized on a published list of the top 300 Junior Innovators across the United States, shared through JIC's Facebook page, Twitter feed and Instagram. Taylor intends to use the monetary prize to help finance this year's STEM fair project, a continuation of her investigation into the effects of Polyethylene plastics. The next step will take place on September 18th, when 30 finalists will be announced from the top 300 entries. Good luck, Taylor! We are routing for you!
