Safety and Security: Understanding Protocols and Responsibilities

Dear Students and Families,

Safety and security remain a top priority at our school. This week, we want to clarify two important safety protocols and address the seriousness of false reporting. **Lockdown vs. Hold in Place**


- Lockdown: This procedure is used when there is an immediate threat to safety on or near campus. During a lockdown, doors are locked, lights are turned off, and everyone remains silent and out of sight.
- Hold in Place: This protocol is used when there is a situation requiring movement to be temporarily restricted. For example, it may be used during a medical emergency or a non-immediate threat. Hallways are cleared, but classroom instruction continues.

The Consequences of False Reporting

False reporting of emergencies is not only disruptive but also has serious consequences. It diverts critical resources, causes unnecessary fear, and may result in legal penalties for those responsible. Students are urged to always report accurate information and think critically about the impact of their actions.
