What are Conch Pride Accounts?

They are free checking accounts with Conch debit cards help raise money up to \$1,000 per month for Key West High School. Keys FCU donates:

\$5 to KWHS for each account opened.

- 1% of each account holder's debit card transactions, up to \$15 per month to KWHS during specific promotional periods like Back to School, Spring Break and Christmas season.

Conch Pride accounts include free adult and teen online & mobile financial education programs that teach them how to save and manage their checking account and credit history and more.

Who can get a Conch Pride Checking Account?

Conch Pride Checking Accounts and Debit Cards are perfect for KWHS students- 14 years and older, parents, teachers, staff, alumni, and fans-that live or work in the Florida Keys.

Where can you open a Conch Pride account?

In Keys Federal Credit Union at 3022 N. Roosevelt Blvd. in Key Plaza, 514 Southard St., and 5300 Overseas Hwy. in Stock Island.

How can KWHS raise more money?

Keys FCU will create and provide all Conch Pride marketing materials. KWHS must distribute, hang, communicate, and publish them.

Attention Seniors:

Congratulations to Neslo Hannah Atilla and Kaylee Matas Cabezuelo for being the FIRST in KWHS history to not only compete in Moot Court but to ADVANCE to Semi-Final round! SO very proud of them!

Moot Court is the simulation of arguments in front of an appellate court. These are the courts, like the Supreme Court, that decide what the law is. Students who compete in moot court must read and understand numerous legal cases, and write their own legal briefs, with no outside assistance, and submit

them. Afterwards, they defend their briefs in front of a panel of real judges who will question them about their arguments.

Our high school team moot court started this year and is in two competitions; one is a federal nationwide tournament, and the other is a state tournament organized by the Florida Bar. The results were just announced for the nationwide tournament, and the Key West High School Team of Neslo Atilla and Kaylee Matas Cabezuleo were selected as one of the twenty-one teams in the nation to advance to the semi-finals! The nationwide tournament uses a real Supreme Court case every year, and this year the issue is the ability of state governments to regulate speech on social media. They will now be advancing and facing other teams in the semi-final rounds, competing for the chance to have oral arguments in front of federal judges in Washington D.C.

- Authors may choose to write a story referencing Williams, his family, one of his characters, or one of the actors/actresses who played a role in his plays or films.
- Submissions must include a title page with the following information: the student's first and last name, if they are submitting a poem or a short story, the title of their submission, and their school's name.
